On June 19, 1865, nearly two years after President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipated Proclamation, Union troops arrived in Galveston Bay, Texas with news of freedom. More than 250,000 African Americans embraced freedom by executive decree in what became known as Juneteenth or Freedom Day.

Celebrated annually during the month of June, Pride Month commemorates the 1969 Stonewall Uprising. Commonly referred to as "Stonewall," this event was a tipping point for the Gay Liberation Movement in the United States. 


Finally, as our meetings are largely virtual, we are planning a midsummer in person social gathering in July and are looking forward to getting together for an evening of fun...and solidarity!




What Happened at The People's Conference for Palestine?


The People's Conference for Palestine brought together over 3,500 people in Detroit to talk about the ongoing genocide in Palestine. There were speakers from all over the world who talked about Israeli history in the light of colonialism and settler colonialism and how this has led to Israel's growing occupation of Palestine. Anti-Zionists Jewish people talked about the rights of Palestinians and how those rights have been trampled on by Israel for decades. Students talked about their encampments in the US and UK to get universities to divest. And community leaders discussed ways they are working with labor in the US and other countries to block arms shipments to Israel and to block Israel ships. Congressmember Rashida Tlaib talked about her family's suffering because of the occupation. All speakers spoke out against the ongoing US support of Israel and called for an immediate end to arms shipments and the need for a ceasefire.

But most importantly, Palestinians talked about their rich history, their desire to be free and to return to a free Palestine with their children.

During last month's #RadChat, participants worked together to create a visual representation of some of the needs, barriers, and considerations to encourage conversations and change around Green Social Work.







"For too long, the goal of therapy has been to help people adapt to oppression and cope with the ongoing trauma of colonial, capitalist and white supremacist systems. Well the old paradigm is crumbling, and frankly *it's long overdue*." - Mullan, PsyD

Decolonizing Therapy shines a bright and loving light on the core wound of colonialism so that we can begin to heal.

It's a loving, but urgent call to:

- bravely and earnestly confront the multi-generational impact of colonization on all of us
- uncover and tend to the real roots of symptoms and suffering
- to recenter a collective healing process for all indigenous peoples, globally; and for those forcibly displaced and made to engage in emotional and physical labor in order to survive-in order to be seen as human

It calls for an end to individualistic and pathologizing Eurocentric methods of wellness—one that includes those who have been purposely excluded and historically forgotten.

It demands a model of mental health that is accessible to all and that offers a path to liberation and thriving.
