Immediate Call to Action: Social Workers, Advocates, Organizers, and Human Service Workers Unite!

Rarely has the unity or solidarity among and across people and workers been so necessary to defeat authoritarianism and oligarchy in the Gilded Age. Attacks on DEI; voting; reproductive freedom and women's health care; health care for all and on public health; unions; immigration and deportation; climate change and environmental protections; the unconstitutional firing of Inspector Generals; the

threats to resign to many administration leaders; the deletion and disappearance of information and data access on government websites; supporting widespread agency deregulation; recommitting to the federal death penalty; cuts to international aid; suspension of federal holidays, and the freeze and temporary "thaw" of much federal funding impacting non-profits in every corner of the U.S. The challenges are enormous but we are stronger - especially when we work together! Solidarity!



CHAPTER UPDATES

The <u>Connecticut Chapter</u> is working on its program of legislative advocacy and work for radical policy change in CT. We are in the process of planning our third Annual People's Forum, scheduled for **February 19th**, where we hear from grassroots activists and individuals with lived experiences, on the concerns they have over legislation that has been introduced in our current legislative session - and that which has not been introduced but should be. This forum is intended to provide an opportunity for progressive/radical activists to have input into the legislative process. It will be held at the State Capitol in Hartford.

In addition to our legislative advocacy work, we are also in the process of working with existing advocacy coalitions to expand our ability to influence policy through organizing strategies to build power. The chapter continues to meet monthly, and our legislative advocacy committee is meeting weekly.



Social Workers & Allies Against Solitary Confinement (SWASC) hosted its first meeting of 2025 on January 27th. The meeting featured a slideshow presentation of our 2024 accomplishments; anyone interested in learning more about our work can view it here.

In 2025, we are looking forward to collaborating with Columbia University's Justice Center by presenting at their 15th annual <u>Beyond the Bars Conference</u>, leading educational webinars, and reintroducing our bill, "Detention Facility Healthcare Privacy and Protection Act" into the NY state legislature. 



Excerpt about this interesting social worker includes:

"...On the way to a different life, he had one more curious experience: representative of a Moscow-based publisher of children's books, from a little office in Chicago. At last, he had become a Midwesterner of sorts, and soon he transitioned to social worker, with an MSW degree and a second marriage, this time to the daughter of a distinguished Jewish Left family.

Williams reflects notably, after all this life experience, that training as a clinical social worker in the middle 1990s, he "learned how enormously empowering and healing it is to be involved even if the outcome is not so good." (59) In the end, he won a prestigious award at the Jane Addams College of Social Work, and went on to teach in the social work college in Tacoma. A Senior Citizen Socialist, he offers this advice: struggle is hard."


